Executive Feedback on Overall Rating	The report does have weaknesses in terms of the level of detail with which the evaluation design is considered and limitations addressed. However, within these constraints, the report does a reasonable job of systematically presenting, analysing, and discussing the evidence from the evaluation process. This is linked to good gender and human rights analysis. Unfortunately, the Executive Summary is not up to the same standard, and reduces the utility of the report for decision makers.

Executive Feedback on Parameter 2	The purpose of the evaluation is particularly clear. Whilst the evaluation criteria are stated, these are not 'unpacked' to define how they will be interpreted and applied. Nevertheless, specific reference is made to human rights and gender issues and this is good. The scope is broadly mentioned, but it would be useful to understand how this evaluation intended to relate to the wider programme – and whether it is only meant to support innovation within Guatemala or also answer questions of relevance to UN Women in Latin America.

Executive Feedback on Parameter 3	The process of the evaluation is described with some detail. However, the overall design of the evaluation – and why this is more or less relevant than other designs – is not discussed. The main limitations presented relate to constraints faced by the evaluators rather than to weaknesses in the selected methods. It would appear from this that the main methodological consideration was the time available to the evaluators and the intention of speaking with a range of stakeholders.
