SECTION 2. INSTRUCTIONS TO VENDORS

GENERAL PROVISIONS	
1. Scope	Vendors are invited to submit a proposal for the services specified in the Terms of Reference (TOR), in accordance with this Request for Proposal (RFP). Vendors shall adhere to all the requirements of this RFP, including any amendment made in writing. This RFP is conducted in accordance with Policies and Procedures of UN Women.
2. Interpretation of the RFP	Any proposal submitted will be regarded as an offer by the vendor and does not constitute or imply the acceptance of the proposal by UN Women. UN Women is under no obligation to award a contract to any vendor as a result of this RFP. Nothing in or in connection with this RFP shall give rise to any liability on the part of UN Women unless and until the contract is signed by UN Women and the successful vendor.
3. Supplier Code of Conduct	<p>All vendors must read the United Nations Supplier Code of Conduct and acknowledge that it provides the minimum standards expected of suppliers to the UN. The Code of Conduct, which includes principles on labour, human rights, environment, and ethical conduct may be found at https://www.un.org/Depts/ptd/about-us/un-supplier-code-conduct. Vendors who take part in this solicitation exercise, and willing to do business with UN Women must take all appropriate measures to ensure that neither themselves nor their parent, subsidiary, affiliate entities or their subcontractors are engaged in any gender-based or other discriminatory employment practices, including those relating to recruitment, promotion, training, remuneration, and benefits.</p> <p>Moreover, vendors should note that the provisions of the Code of Conduct will be binding on the vendor in the event that the vendor is awarded a contract, pursuant to the terms and conditions of any such contract.</p> <p>UN Women also expects all its suppliers to adhere to the principles of the United Nations Global Compact and requests that all vendors observe the highest standard of ethics during the entire solicitation process, as well as the duration of any contract that may be awarded as a result of this RFP.</p> <p>UN Women implements a policy of zero tolerance on proscribed practices, including fraud¹, corruption, collusion, unethical practices, and obstruction. UN Women requires all vendors to observe the highest standard of ethics at all stages, including pre-bidding/solicitation, during the procurement process, post-contract award, and contract implementation.</p> <p>UN Women is committed to prevent, identify, and address all acts of fraud and corrupt practices against UN Women as well as third parties involved in UN Women activities. In pursuance of this policy, UN Women:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Shall reject a proposal if it determines that the selected vendor has engaged in any corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for the contract in question. • Further, UN Women shall declare a vendor ineligible, either indefinitely or for a stated period, to be awarded a contract if at any time it determines that the vendor has engaged in any corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for, or in executing a UN Women contract.
4. Eligible Vendors	<p>Vendors should be a legally incorporated commercial entity with legal capacity as a firm(s) with a valid registration, to enter into a binding commercial contract with UN Women.</p> <p>A vendor, and all parties constituting the vendor, may have the nationality of, or be incorporated in, any country. A vendor shall be deemed to have the nationality of a country if the vendor is constituted, incorporated, or registered and operates in conformity with the provisions of the laws of that country.</p> <p>Vendor shall not be eligible to submit a proposal if at the time of proposal submission:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • is suspended by or has any pending disputes or litigations with UN Women or other Organizations, Funds or Programs of the UN System;

¹ Fraud: any act or omission, including a misrepresentation, that knowingly or recklessly misleads, or attempts to mislead, a party to obtain a financial or other benefit or to avoid an obligation.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • has engaged in any money-laundering activities, which include, but are not limited to: any transaction involving the transfer, disbursement, transportation, transmission, or exchange of funds (including wire transfers and currency exchanges) by any means. • is included in the Ineligibility List, hosted by <u>UNGM</u>, that aggregates information disclosed by Agencies, Funds or Programs of the UN System; • is included in the <u>Consolidated United Nations Security Council Sanctions List</u>, including the <u>UN Security Council Resolution 1267/1989 list</u>; • is included in the <u>World Bank Corporate Procurement Listing of Non-Responsible Vendors</u> and <u>World Bank Listing of Ineligible Firms and Individuals</u>. <p>As part of the RFP exercise, by submitting a Proposal(s), vendor(s) declares that it, its parent, affiliate and subsidiary entities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ is/are not a company, or associated with a company or individual, under procurement prohibition lists as stated above. ○ Is/are not under formal investigation, nor has been sanctioned within the preceding three (3) years by any national authority of a United Nations Member State for engaging or having engaged in proscribed practices, including but not limited to corruption, fraud, coercion, collusion, obstruction, or any other unethical practice. ○ has not declared bankruptcy, is/are not involved in bankruptcy or receivership proceedings, and there is no judgment or pending legal action against them that could impair their operations in the foreseeable future; ○ undertakes not to engage in proscribed practices (including but not limited to: corruption, fraud, coercion, collusion, obstruction, or any other unethical practice), with UN Women or any other party, and to conduct business in a manner that averts any financial, operational, reputational or other undue risks to UN Women. <p>It is the vendor's responsibility to ensure that its employees, joint venture partners, sub-contractors, service providers, suppliers and/or their employees meet the eligibility requirements as established by UN Women.</p>
5.Conflict of Interest	<p>All vendors found to have a conflict of interest shall be disqualified. Vendors may be considered to have a conflict of interest if:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • they are or have been associated in the past, with a person or an entity or any of its affiliates that have been involved in the preparation of the design, specifications, TOR, cost analysis/estimation and other documents to be used for the procurement of the goods/ services/ civil works required in the present procurement process. • They have a close business or family relationship with a UN Women personnel who: (i) are directly or indirectly involved in any stage of the RFP-process of such contract; or (ii) would be involved in the implementation or supervision of such contract; • They have an interest in other vendors (who are submitting a proposal/s in response to this RFP) including when they have common ownership and/or management. Vendors shall not submit more than one proposal, except for alternative offers, if permitted. <p>This will result in the disqualification of all proposals in which the vendor is involved. Vendors must disclose any actual or potential conflict of interest in their proposal, and they shall be deemed ineligible for this procurement process unless such conflict of interest is resolved in a manner acceptable to UN Women. Failure to disclose any actual or potential conflict of interest may lead to the vendor being sanctioned or debarred by UN Women, and the proposal security (if applicable) shall be surrendered to UN Women.</p>
6.Proprietary information	<p>The RFP documents and any Terms of Reference or information issued or furnished by UN Women are issued solely to enable a proposal to be completed and may not be used for any other purpose. The RFP documents and any additional information provided to vendors shall remain the property of UN Women. All documents which may form part of the proposal will become the property of UN Women, and will not be returned to vendors.</p>
7.Publicity	<p>The UN Women name and logo may never be used by any person or entity without the prior written agreement by UN Women.</p> <p>During the RFP process, a vendor is not permitted to create any publicity in connection with the RFP. The UN Women name and logo cannot be used to solicit public awareness of its products or services on the basis of a connection with UN Women.</p>

SOLICITATION DOCUMENTS	
8. Clarification of Solicitation Documents	<p>Vendors may request clarifications on any of the RFP documents no later than the date indicated in the RFP. Any request for clarification and all other correspondence in relation to this RFP must be sent in writing through the “Messages” functionality in the <u>Quantum</u> system. Communication through any other channels than as described in the RFP at any stage of the solicitation process may be cause for the vendor’s proposal to be compromised and ultimately rejected.</p> <p>UN Women will publish the responses (including an explanation of the query but without identifying the source of inquiry) to all prospective vendors in the <u>Quantum</u> system. Responses will be made to clarification questions received by the deadline for questions indicated in the RFP. Responses to clarification requests shall be binding for all vendors.</p> <p>Explanations or interpretations provided by UN Women personnel through the use of other communication channels, than described above, will not be considered binding or official.</p> <p>UN Women shall endeavor to respond to clarifications expeditiously, but any delay in such response shall not cause an obligation on the part of UN Women to extend the submission date of the proposals unless UN Women deems that such an extension is justified and necessary.</p>
9. Amendment of Solicitation Documents	<p>At any time prior to the deadline for proposal submission, UN Women may for any reason, such as in response to a clarification requested by a vendor, modify the RFP in the form of an amendment to the RFP. Amendments will be made available to all prospective vendors.</p> <p>If the amendment is substantial, UN Women may extend the deadline for submission of proposals to give the vendors reasonable time to modify and resubmit the proposal in accordance with the amendment requirements.</p>
PREPARATION OF PROPOSALS	
10. Costs of Preparation of Proposal	<p>The vendor shall bear all costs related to the preparation and/or submission of the proposal, attendance at any pre-proposal conference, meetings, or oral presentations regardless of whether its proposal is selected or not. Vendors acknowledge that their participation in any stage of the solicitation process for this RFP is at their own risk and cost and shall not in any way include these as a direct cost of the assignment.</p> <p>UN Women shall not be responsible or liable for those costs, regardless of the conduct or outcome of the procurement process.</p>
11. Language	<p>The proposal, as well as any and all related documents and correspondence exchanged by the vendor and UN Women, shall be written in the English language, or as otherwise indicated in the RFP. Any document furnished by the vendor in another language than what is indicated in the RFP must be submitted together with an English translation of relevant excerpts. In such a case, for purposes of interpretation of the Proposal, the English translation shall govern.</p>
12. Documents Establishing Eligibility and Qualifications of the Vendor	<p>The vendor shall furnish documentary evidence of its status as an eligible and qualified vendor, using the forms/instructions provided in the <u>Quantum</u> system and providing the documents required. In order to award a contract to a vendor, its qualifications must be documented to UN Women’s satisfaction.</p>
13. Technical Proposal Format and Content	<p>The vendor is required to submit a technical proposal using the forms/instructions provided in the <u>Quantum</u> system and taking into consideration the requirements in the RFP.</p> <p>The technical proposal shall not include any price or financial information. A technical proposal containing material financial information will be declared non-responsive.</p> <p>References to supporting documentation, including descriptive material and brochures should be included in the text of the Technical Proposal and the supporting documentation attached as annexes to the Technical Proposal.</p> <p>Any information in the Technical Proposal which the vendor considers proprietary, should be clearly marked “proprietary” next to the relevant part of the text. Proprietary information will remain internally as part of the confidential procurement process only and will be redacted if a document containing such information is published publicly.</p>
14. Financial Proposal	<p>The financial proposal shall be prepared using the form/instructions provided in the <u>Quantum</u> system and taking into consideration the requirements in the RFP. It shall list all major cost components associated with the services and the detailed breakdown of such costs.</p>

	<p>Any output and activities described in the technical proposal but not priced in the financial proposal shall be assumed to be included in the prices of other activities or items as well as in the final total price. Prices quoted shall be fixed during the performance of the contract and not subject to variation on any account, unless otherwise specified in the RFP and agreed by both parties.</p> <p>Prices and other financial information must not be disclosed in any other place except in the financial proposal. Proposals with no fixed prices will not be considered for evaluation and will be disqualified.</p>
15. Currencies	<p>All prices shall be quoted in the currency or currencies indicated in the RFP, or any freely convertible currency. Where proposals are quoted in different currencies, for the purposes of comparison of all proposals:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) UN Women will convert the currency quoted in the proposal into United States Dollars (USD), in accordance with the UN Operational Rate of Exchange in force at the time of the proposal submission deadline date and time. a) In the event that UN Women selects a proposal for an award that is quoted in a currency different from the preferred currency, UN Women shall reserve the right to award the contract in the currency of UN Women's preference, using the conversion method specified above.
16. Duties and Taxes	<p>Article II, Section 7, of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities provides, inter alia, that the United Nations (which includes UN Women as a subsidiary organ) is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs duties, prohibitions and restrictions on imports and exports in respect of articles imported or exported by the United Nations for its official use. All proposals shall be submitted net of any direct taxes and any other taxes and duties unless otherwise specified in the RFP.</p>
17. Proposal Validity Period	<p>Proposals shall remain valid for the period specified in the RFP, commencing on the deadline for submission of proposals. A proposal valid for a shorter period may be rejected by UN Women and considered non-responsive.</p> <p>During the proposal validity period, the vendor shall maintain its original Proposal without any change, including the availability of the key personnel, the proposed rates, and the total price.</p> <p>In exceptional circumstances, prior to the expiration of the proposal validity period, UN Women may request vendors to extend the period of validity of their proposals. The request and the responses shall be made in writing and shall be considered an integral part of the proposal. A vendor granting the request will not be required nor permitted to modify its proposal.</p> <p>If the vendor agrees to extend the validity of its proposal, it shall be done without any change to the original proposal but will be required to extend the validity of the proposal security, if required, for the period of the extension, and in compliance with the provision of Proposal security - in all respects.</p> <p>The vendor has the right to refuse to extend the validity of its proposal without forfeiting the proposal security, if required, in which case the proposal shall not be further evaluated.</p>
18. Proposal Security/Bid Bond^[6]	<p>Proposal security, if required, shall be provided in the amount and form indicated in the RFP. The proposal security shall be valid for a minimum of thirty (30) days after the final date of the validity of the proposal, after which the proposal security will automatically become null and void, unless a dispute arises in relation to the proposal security.</p> <p>The Original Proposal Security must be sent via courier or hand delivery to UN Women procuring office. The vendor must arrange for the Original Proposal Security to be received by UN Women procuring office before the deadline for submission of the proposals. If the Original Proposal Security is required by the RFP but is not received by UN Women before the deadline for submission, the offer shall be rejected.</p> <p>The proposal security shall be denominated in the currency indicated in the RFP. The proposal security shall be issued by a regulated financial institution (e.g. a bank) that is certified by the central bank in the country where the bank is located. UN Women may, at its discretion, reject any proposal security that does not comply with this requirement. The proposal security shall be in one of the following forms:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Bank guarantee or irrevocable letter of credit, or • Cashier's check, or certified check.

	<p>If the proposal security amount, or its validity period, is found to be less than is required by UN Women, UN Women shall reject the proposal.</p> <p>In the event an electronic submission is allowed in the RFP, vendors shall include a copy of the proposal security in their electronic proposal and the original of the proposal security must be sent via courier or hand delivered as per the instructions of the RFP.</p> <p>Unsuccessful vendors' proposal securities will be discharged as promptly as possible and can be physically picked up by the vendor at UN Women's location, no later than thirty (30) days after the expiration of the period of proposal validity, unless amended thereafter, as prescribed by UN Women.</p> <p>The Proposal security may be forfeited by UN Women, and the proposal rejected, in the event of any, or combination, of the following conditions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If the vendor withdraws its offer during the period of the proposal validity, or • In the event the successful Vendor fails: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ to sign the contract resulting from the RFP process in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the RFP (and within the timeframe required for signature), including if applicable, variation of requirement; or ○ to furnish the performance security, insurances, or other documents that UN Women may require as a condition precedent to the effectivity of the contract that may be awarded to the vendor.
19. Joint Venture, Consortium or Association	<p>A vendor may submit a proposal in association with other entities, particularly with an entity in the country where the goods and/or services are to be provided. If the vendor is a group of legal entities that will form or have formed a Joint Venture (JV), Consortium or Association for the proposal, each such legal entity will confirm in their joint proposal that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • they have designated one party to act as a lead entity, duly vested with the authority to legally bind the members of the JV, Consortium or Association jointly and severally, and this will be evidenced by a duly notarized agreement among the legal entities, which will be submitted along with the proposal; and • if they are awarded the contract, the contract shall be entered into by and between UN Women and the designated lead entity, who will be acting for and on behalf of all the member entities comprising the Joint Venture, Consortium or Association. • all parties of such joint venture, /consortium/association shall be jointly and severally liable to UN Women for any obligations arising from their proposal and the contract that may be awarded to the joint venture/consortium/association as a result of this RFP. <p>After the deadline for submission of the proposal, the lead entity identified to represent the JV, Consortium or Association shall not be altered without the prior written consent of UN Women.</p> <p>If a JV, Consortium, or Association's proposal is the proposal selected for an award, UN Women will award the contract to the Joint Venture, Consortium or Association in the name of its designated lead entity. The lead entity will sign the contract for and on behalf of all other member entities.</p> <p>The lead entity and the member entities of the JV, Consortium, or Association shall abide by the provisions of Article 20 below - "Only one Proposal"- herein in respect of submitting only one proposal.</p> <p>The description of the organization of the JV, Consortium, or Association must clearly define the expected role of each of the entities in the Joint Venture, Consortium or Association in delivering the requirements of the RFP, both in the proposal and the JV, Consortium or Association Agreement. All entities that comprise the JV, Consortium, or Association shall be subject to the eligibility and qualification assessment by UN Women.</p> <p>A JV, Consortium or Association, in presenting its track record and experience, should clearly differentiate between:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> f) Those that were undertaken together by the members of the JV, Consortium or Association; and

	<p>f) Those that were undertaken individually by the members of the JV, Consortium, or Association.</p> <p>Previous contracts completed by experts working individually, but who are currently permanently or temporarily associated with any of the member entities, cannot be claimed as the experience of the JV, Consortium or Association or those of its members, but should only be claimed by the individual experts themselves in their presentation of their individual credentials.</p> <p>JV, Consortium, or Associations are encouraged for high value, multi-sectoral requirements when the spectrum of expertise and resources required may not be available within one entity.</p>
20. Only one Proposal	<p>The vendor (including the individual members of any Joint Venture, Consortium or Association) shall submit only one proposal, either in its own name or as part of a Joint Venture, Consortium or Association.</p> <p>Proposals submitted by two (2) or more vendors shall all be rejected if they are found to have any of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> c) they have at least one partner, director or shareholder in common; or c) any one of them receive or have received any direct or indirect subsidy from the other/s; or c) they have the same legal representative for purposes of this RFP; or c) they have a relationship with each other, directly or through common third parties, that puts them in a position to have access to information about or influence on the proposal of another vendor regarding this RFP process. c) they are subcontractors to each other's proposal, or a subcontractor to one proposal also submits another proposal under its name as a lead vendor, or some key personnel proposed to be in the team of one vendor participates in more than one proposal received for this RFP process. This condition relating to the personnel does not apply to subcontractors being included in more than one proposal.
21. Alternative Proposals	<p>Unless otherwise specified in the RFP, alternative proposals shall not be considered. If the submission of alternative proposals is allowed in the RFP, a vendor may submit an alternative proposal, but only if it also submits a proposal conforming to the RFP requirements. Where the conditions for its acceptance are met, or justifications are clearly established, UN Women reserves the right to award a contract based on an alternative proposal.</p> <p>If multiple/alternative proposals are being submitted, they must be clearly marked as "Main Proposal" and "Alternative Proposal". If no indication is provided as to which proposal is the main proposal and which is/are the alternative proposal(s), then all proposals may be rejected.</p>
22. Pre-Proposal Conference	<p>When appropriate, a pre-proposal conference will be conducted at the date, time, and location and according to any instructions specified in the RFP.</p> <p>If it is stated that the pre-proposal conference is mandatory, a Vendor who does not attend the pre-proposal conference shall become ineligible to submit a proposal under this RFP. If it is stated that the pre-proposal conference is not mandatory, non-attendance shall not result in disqualification of an interested vendor.</p> <p>Information about each vendor's representatives who will attend the pre-proposal conference shall be submitted in writing to the UN Women contact as listed in the RFP, including the full name and position of each representative at least 48 hours before the pre-proposal conference is to be held.</p> <p>UN Women will not issue any formal answers to questions from vendors regarding the RFP or proposal process during the pre-proposal conference. All questions shall be submitted in writing through the "Messages" functionality in the <u>Quantum</u> system.</p> <p>The pre-proposal conference shall be conducted for the purpose of providing background information only. Without limiting the Article 25 below - "Vendors Responsibility to Inform Themselves"-, vendors shall not rely upon any information, statement, or representation made at the pre-proposal conference unless that information, statement, or representation is confirmed by UN Women in writing.</p>

	<p>Minutes of the pre-proposal conference will be disseminated through the <u>Quantum</u> system. No verbal statement made during the conference shall modify the terms and conditions of the RFP unless specifically incorporated in the minutes of the vendor's conference or issued/posted as an amendment to RFP.</p>
23. Site inspection	<p>When appropriate, a site inspection will be conducted at the date, time, and location and according to any instructions specified in the RFP.</p> <p>If it is stated in the RFP that the site inspection is mandatory, a vendor who does not attend the site inspection shall become ineligible to submit a proposal under this RFP.</p> <p>If it is stated that the site inspection is not mandatory, non-attendance shall not result in the disqualification of an interested vendor.</p> <p>Vendors participating in a site inspection shall be responsible for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Arranging for and wearing any necessary personal protective equipment, including at a minimum: safety helmets, boots and reflective vests; and • Making and obtaining any travel/visa arrangements that may be required for the vendors to participate in a site inspection. <p>Prior to attending a site inspection, vendors shall execute an indemnity waiver releasing UN Women in respect of any liability that may arise from:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ loss of or damage to any real or personal property; ○ personal injury, disease or illness, or death of any person; ○ financial loss or expense, arising out of the carrying out of that site inspection; and ○ transportation by UN Women to the site (if provided) as a result of any accidents or malicious acts by third parties. <p>UN Women will not issue any formal answers to questions from vendors regarding the RFP or solicitation process during a site inspection. All questions shall be submitted in accordance with Article 8 – “Clarification of solicitation documents”.</p> <p>A site inspection will be conducted to provide background information only. Without limiting the Article 25 - “Vendors Responsibility to inform themselves”- vendors shall not rely upon any information, statement, or representation made at a site inspection unless that information, statement, or representation is confirmed by UN Women in writing.</p>
24. Errors or Omissions	<p>Vendors shall immediately notify UN Women in writing of any ambiguities, errors, omissions, discrepancies, inconsistencies, or other faults in any part of the RFP, with full details of those ambiguities, errors, omissions, discrepancies, inconsistencies or other faults, and clarify their proposal. Vendors shall not benefit from such ambiguities, errors, omissions, discrepancies, inconsistencies, or other faults.</p>
25. Vendors Responsibility to Inform Themselves	<p>Vendors shall be responsible for informing themselves in preparing their proposals. SECTION 4. TERMS OF REFERENCE

A. BACKGROUND

UN Women, grounded in the vision of equality enshrined in the Charter of the United Nations, works for the elimination of discrimination against women and girls; the empowerment of women; and the achievement of equality between women and men as partners and beneficiaries of development, human rights, humanitarian action and peace and security.

Indonesia's rich socio-cultural diversity and expansive geography, spanning more than 18,000 islands that are home to over 300 ethnic groups, has long shaped its development landscape. While the country has achieved notable progress in social and economic indicators, persistent inequalities, regional disparities, and localized conflicts continue to pose challenges to inclusive development. In 2022 when the Project was conceptualized, the Gender Inequality Index (GII) for Indonesia was 0.459³, placing the country in the medium range globally and underscoring persistent gaps in women's empowerment and access to opportunities, including political representation (21.74% of National Parliament Seats in 2022) and labor force participation (52.53% in 2022). Women's representation in the security sector also remains low due to deep-rooted societal norms and institutional barriers. At the same time, radicalization and violent extremism remain a serious threat, particularly as extremist groups adapt through online recruitment and exploit community grievances. Women's roles in both preventing and participating in violent extremism have also become more visible, highlighting the urgent need for gender-responsive prevention strategies. Research shows that patriarchal attitudes and gender-based violence are among the strongest predictors of extremist sympathies, underscoring the importance of addressing gender norms in building community resilience⁴.

In this context, the Women, Peace and Security (WPS) agenda in Indonesia has gained increased relevance, particularly through localized and inclusive peacebuilding approaches. Since 2017, UN Women has supported efforts to strengthen community resilience by advancing women's leadership in peacebuilding, including through the Peace Village model⁵. This initiative, rooted in women's economic empowerment and social cohesion, has been implemented in diverse localities affected by intolerance and violence. At the national policy level, UN Women has supported the development and implementation of Indonesia's first National Action Plan for Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism that Leads to Terrorism (RAN-PE). The plan incorporates a gender perspective and a human rights-based approach, addressing the linkages between traditional and non-traditional security, including socioeconomic inequality and marginalization. It emphasizes prevention and protection through two main objectives: increasing community resilience to violent extremism and safeguarding citizens' right to security. Indonesia's National Counter-Terrorism Agency (BNPT) has cited the Peace Village initiative as a good practice model with potential for expansion under the Prevention Pillar of RAN-PE. The concept is designed to be adaptive across Indonesia's diverse local contexts.

Grounded in its mandate and in response to the context, UN Women Indonesia has prioritized WPS as a key area under its Strategic Note (SN) 2021–2025 and in alignment with the UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework (UNSDCF). Within this framework, UN Women Indonesia, with funding from the Kingdom of the Netherlands, has been implementing a multi-year project aimed at deepening and expanding women-led, community-based conflict prevention initiatives to promote social cohesion and resilience, particularly in regions vulnerable to radicalization and social conflict (hereafter referred to as "the Project").

The project directly contributes to UNSDCF Outcome 1: *"People living in Indonesia, especially those at risk of being left furthest behind, are empowered to fulfil their human development potential as members of a pluralistic, tolerant, inclusive, and just society, free of gender and all other forms of discrimination"*, which is based on the **Theory of Change (TOC)** that:

If major stakeholders, including national and regional institutions, local communities, youth and women leaders have increased capacity to implement WPS commitments and promote tolerance, social cohesion, and peace, including the prevention of violent extremism; and **if** violence against women and girls is reduced through effective prevention and response approaches, and other relevant mechanisms; **then** people living in Indonesia, especially women, will be empowered to fulfil their human rights and development potential as members of pluralistic, tolerant, inclusive, and just society, free of gender discrimination, **because** the threat of extremism and misogyny as major obstacles in women's realization of their human potential will have been addressed.

The initiative builds upon the "Peace Village" model pioneered by UN Women and the Wahid Foundation since 2017 which centers women's leadership as a driver of peace and employs women's economic empowerment as an entry point to address community-based conflict and prevent and counter violent extremism (PCVE). By deepening and expanding the peace village concept, it will focus on supporting women to achieve meaningful participation and leadership in conflict prevention, resolution and recovery to promote social cohesion and sustainable peace. It is based on the **sub-TOC** that:

If:

- Women and women-led working groups (*Pokja*) are able to influence and benefit from local policy/decision-making processes for conflict prevention, resolution, and recovery;
- Local governments have increased capacity to develop and implement gender-responsive village action plans to enhance social cohesion, resilience, and peace;
- Communities have enhanced capacities to promote social cohesion, conflict prevention (including preventing violent extremism), and resilience;
- Youth (including young women and men) have skills to generate alternative narratives for the prevention of radicalization and violent extremism; and
- National institutions and systems have increased capacity to promote tolerance and discourage violent extremism among the children and relatives of those convicted or accused of terrorism offences.

Then Indonesia will be able to strengthen community resilience and promote tolerance and social cohesion and peace, **because** policy/programme interventions will be more inclusive and gender-responsive and communities will benefit from women's participation and leadership in enhancing social cohesion and sustainable peace.

Spanning from **01 January 2023 to 31 December 2025**, the project operates at the intersection of grassroots peacebuilding and national policy implementation. More specifically, the proposed interventions will contribute to deepening and expanding the Peace Village initiative, with a focus on supporting women to achieve meaningful participation and leadership in conflict prevention, resolution, and recovery to promote social cohesion and sustainable peace.

Under the project, UN Women works at the national level with the Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Cultural Affairs (CMHDCA), the Ministry of Women's Empowerment and Child Protection (MoWECP), and the National Counter Terrorism Agency (BNPT) on the implementation, evaluation, and planning of the National Action Plan for Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism (RAN-PE) and the National Action Plan on Social Conflict (RAN P3AKS). At the subnational level, the project's scope covers West Java, Central Sulawesi, and West Nusa Tenggara where UN Women works with the Women's Empowerment and Child Protection Agency, National Unity and Politics Agency (Kesbangpol), Community and Village Empowerment Service, and Regional Development Planning Agency at the provincial and city/district (Bima, Bogor, Depok, and Poso) levels to effectively localize the NAPs. At the community level, 13 villages in Bima, Poso, Depok and Bogor are supported to implement the Peace Village model and institutionalize mechanisms that support the active engagement and meaningful participation of women and youth in peacebuilding and village decision-making.

Throughout all levels of engagement, UN Women collaborates with two responsible partners: the Wahid Foundation, which leads the implementation of the Peace Village model, promotes gender-responsive PCVE solutions, supports local action plans, and empowers women and youth in peacebuilding; and AMAN Indonesia, which focuses on strengthening the capacity of national and local policymakers to develop, implement, and evaluate gender-responsive action plans that advance the WPS agenda.

Throughout these engagements, UN Women integrates a strong focus on gender equality, youth engagement, and social norm change, including the engagement of men and boys in peacebuilding efforts. With its unique combination of policy engagement and grassroots mobilization, this initiative contributes to operationalizing Indonesia's WPS and PCVE commitments and is seen as a model for inclusive and sustainable peacebuilding in the region.

B. PURPOSE AND USE OF THE EVALUATION

These Terms of Reference (TOR) seek to guide the recruitment of a Service Provider to conduct the final evaluation of the project. This final evaluation is a mandatory exercise, as specified in the Project Document, and is intended to assess the delivery of the project's results as initially planned and as adjusted during implementation, while capturing key lessons learned to inform future programming. As a summative evaluation, it will be conducted at the end of the project's life cycle to reflect on the implementation period from 01 January 2023 to 31 December 2025, and to determine the extent to which the expected outcomes were achieved.

The evaluation will serve both accountability and learning purposes. It will provide an independent assessment by external evaluators of the project's performance in relation to its stated objectives and results framework, and generate evidence on what worked, what did not, and why. This includes assessing the project's contribution to UN Women Indonesia's SN 2021–2025 and UNSDCF Outcome 1. The users of the evaluation will include UN Women, including both the Indonesia Country Office, Asia-Pacific Regional office, and the Independent Evaluation Service; the Government of the Netherlands; and partners from the Government of Indonesia and civil society.

C. OBJECTIVES

The overall objective of the joint evaluation is to assess progress made over the project period towards the attainment of the intended outcome, *"People living in Indonesia, especially those at risk of being left furthest behind, are empowered to fulfil their human development potential as members of a pluralistic, tolerant, inclusive, and just society, free of gender and all other forms of discrimination"*. The evaluation should also provide practical and forward-looking recommendations to inform follow-up actions, potential scaling or replication, and future programme design by UN Women and its partners.

The evaluation will be guided by the OECD DAC criteria (i.e., relevance, coherence, effectiveness, efficiency, impact, sustainability, and human rights and gender equality). All evaluation processes at UN Women establish mechanisms to ensure high quality evaluation processes and products as outlined in the [UN Women Evaluation Policy](#) and [Handbook](#). The Evaluation Report will adapt the approach outlined in the [UN Women Country Portfolio Evaluation Guidance](#) and should also follow the [United Nations Editorial Manual](#). The UN Women Evaluation Report Quality Assurance (GERAAS) criteria will be used to assure quality. All products are subject to quality assurance review by the peer reviewer, the evaluation management group (EMG) and the evaluation reference group (ERG).

The main objectives of the evaluation are to:

- Assess the extent to which the project achieved its intended outputs and contributed to the overall outcome under UNSDCF Outcome 1, with specific attention to relevance, coherence, effectiveness, efficiency, impact, and sustainability.
- Assess the effectiveness of project strategies such as the Peace Village model, support for local action plans, capacity building for policymakers, peacebuilding through women's economic empowerment, and youth engagement in advancing inclusive and gender-responsive peacebuilding.
- Assess organizational efficiency, including whether resources are strategically allocated and efficiently used to deliver expected outputs and outcomes in a timely manner.

- Assess the relevance of the project's contributions at the community, sub-national, and national levels, including alignment with Indonesia's WPS and PCVE commitments, as well as international normative frameworks on gender equality and women's empowerment.
- Analyse how gender equality, social inclusion, and human rights principles were integrated throughout the design and implementation of the project.
- Identify and validate lessons learned, promising practices, and innovative approaches that contributed to achieving project results and could inform future programming.
- Assess whether course corrections were made during implementation and whether these adjustments contributed to improved results.
- Provide practical and forward-looking recommendations for strengthening, scaling, or replicating similar initiatives, particularly the Peace Village model and policy localization work.
- Contribute to UN Women's institutional accountability to the donor and stakeholders by validating evidence of results achieved, challenges encountered, and the overall value of the intervention.
- Support institutional learning within UN Women and its partners with recommendations to inform the design and implementation of future W/YPS and PCVE programming.

D. SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS

The evaluation will cover all components of the programme, including those implemented by partners.

- **Project Title:** UN Women Indonesia Strategic Note (SN) 2021–2025/United Nations Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework (UNSDCF) Outcome 1
- **Project Duration:** The Project runs from 01 January 2023 to 31 December 2025. The evaluation will cover the entire duration of the Project, from 01 January 2023 through Quarter 3 of 2025, as the final year of implementation. Given the evaluation overlaps with the final two quarters of project implementation, some ongoing or upcoming activities may be referenced in documentation and interviews but may fall outside the evaluable scope.
- **Donor:** Government of the Kingdom of the Netherlands
- **Geographical Coverage:** The evaluation will cover national, subnational, and village-level interventions, focusing on locations where the project activities was implemented, including:
 - **West Nusa Tenggara**, with an emphasis on Bima Regency and the Villages of Dadibou, Kalampa, Penapali, Renda and Roka
 - **Central Sulawesi**, with an emphasis on Poso Regency and the Villages of Kilo, Malitu, Masani, Sepe, and Tambarana
 - **West Java**, particularly the Cities of Depok and Bogor

In addition to these geographic areas, the evaluation will consider the Project's contributions to national-level policy processes and institutional engagement related to WPS and PCVE.

The service provider is expected to conduct at least 1 field visit each to West Nusa Tenggara, Central Sulawesi, and West Java. The cost of travel should be included in the proposal.

- **Project Beneficiaries:** The targeted beneficiaries include key government stakeholders at the national, subnational, and village level; humanitarian and peace actors and rights-holders, including gender advocates, civil society organizations with particular focus on women-led and youth-led organizations, and other associations at the national and subnational level; as well as the broader group of women and girls, men and boys in Indonesia, particularly those who are vulnerable to violence, conflict and crisis.

- **Direct beneficiaries:** The Project directly benefited 10 communities in Poso, Central Sulawesi and Bima, West Nusa Tenggara listed above. Within these communities, women, men and youth leaders were particularly targeted with the project activities.
- **Indirect beneficiaries:** The project also benefited approx. 160,000 people at the village level, which include community members and households in Peace Villages who benefited from the decision-making changes and other positive externalities driven by the direct beneficiaries through local action plans and other activities.
- **Evaluation Stakeholder Coverage:** The evaluation will stakeholders (i.e., beneficiaries, government partners, civil society partners, and UN Women project staff) at the national, subnational and village levels where appropriate.
- **Limitations:** While the evaluation is expected to cover all key components and geographies, certain limitations may apply:
 - As the evaluation will occur before full project closure, some activities implemented in the final quarter(s) may be referenced but not fully assessed.
 - Field visits may be adjusted or substituted with virtual consultations depending on travel feasibility and security considerations in target areas.
 - To ensure accuracy and balance, triangulation of findings from multiple sources (interviews, documents, monitoring data) will be applied. Where full coverage is not feasible, deep dives into select geographies and interventions will provide insight into outcome-level achievements.

E. METHODOLOGY

The evaluation employs a non-experimental, theory-based approach using mixed qualitative and quantitative methods. A re-constructed Theory of Change will be used as the basis for contribution analysis. Case studies will be the primary source of information for the assessment of contributions to outcomes in the selected thematic or operational area. It will generate credible, evidence-based, gender-responsive, and human rights-based findings through triangulation across multiple sources and stakeholder perspectives.

The evaluation will assess project performance against the OECD-DAC criteria (relevance, coherence, effectiveness, efficiency, impact, and sustainability), with a particular emphasis on gender equality, social inclusion, and the Leave No One Behind (LNOB) principle.

The evaluation will utilize a mixed-method approach including a wide range of data sources, including documents, field visits and observation, institutional information systems, financial and programmatic records, among others with the following methods for analysis and data collection:

- **Interviews** with key informants identified through the stakeholder analysis across all stakeholder groups. Approximately 10-15 interviews in total will be conducted with government counterparts and partners, with additional interviews to be conducted with UN Women personnel.
- **Surveys** of UN Women personnel and external partners
- **Focus Group Discussions** to the extent possible outcome harvesting or storytelling with key stakeholders and partners and potentially women and male rights holders that have participated in programming efforts of UN Women related to the selected case studies. Approximately 6-10 FGDs in total will be conducted across 2 project locations.
- **Case studies** may be identified for a more in-depth look into priority areas.
- **Key document analyses** undertaken primarily during the inception phase will inform the evaluation approach and help to contextualize findings, conclusions and recommendations. The team may utilize different analytical frameworks such as from a diverse SOGIESC perspective, the building block framework to look at the integrated mandate, and gender at work framework.

The following analyses will also inform the overall evaluation:

- **Evaluability assessment** to help determine the evaluation approach and gaps in data, the quality of the programme logic (linkages between the outcomes, outputs and indicators) as articulated in the project

results framework and organisational effectiveness and efficiency framework, the availability of baseline data, and the availability of documents necessary for the evaluation will be assessed.

- **Contextual analysis** that will include an analysis of the key external influencing factors identified above and how they may affect realization of women's rights in Indonesia.

A qualitative analysis software, such as NVivo, will be used to analyze interviews and focus group discussions. Multiple lines of evidence will inform the contribution analysis. Sources and methods of information will be triangulated to ensure robust findings that can be used with confidence. The inception report will provide more details on the selected approach and methods based on desk review and evaluability assessment, scoping interviews, and consultations with the Evaluation Management Group (EMG) and Evaluation Reference Group (ERG), with roles as described below.

Data collection methods and processes should be gender-responsive and data should be systematically disaggregated by sex and, to the extent possible, disaggregated by age, geographical region, ethnicity, disability, migratory status and other contextually relevant markers of equity. Specific guidelines should be observed, namely the UNEG guidance on [Integrating Human Rights and Gender Equality in Evaluations \(2024\)](#) and [UN Disability Inclusion Strategy Evaluation Accountability](#), 2019. The evaluation should adhere to and be guided by the [UNEG Norms and Standards](#) (2016) and the [UNEG Ethical Guidelines](#) (2020) at every stage of the evaluation process, observing the principles of integrity, accountability, respect and beneficence.

F. **KEY EVALUATION QUESTIONS**

The final evaluation will be guided by the OECD/DAC evaluation criteria of relevance, coherence, effectiveness, organizational efficiency, impact, and sustainability, with an additional criterion of Gender Equality and Human Rights. These criteria will help assess the Project's performance and generate actionable recommendations.

The evaluation team may refine or expand the list of questions during the inception phase, in consultation with UN Women. The evaluation team will also develop an evaluation matrix during the inception phase in consultation with the Evaluation Management Group (EMG) and the Evaluation Reference Group (ERG) which will outline the questions and means of answering them.

The EMG will be comprised of the Regional Evaluation Specialist, Project and Programme Manager, Monitoring & Reporting Analyst, and the Country Representative or Head of Programme. Proper storage of data is essential for ensuring confidentiality. The UNEG guidelines note the importance of ethical conduct for the following reasons:

Responsible use of power: All those engaged in evaluation processes are responsible for upholding the proper conduct of the evaluation.

Ensuring credibility: With a fair, impartial and complete assessment, stakeholders are more likely to have faith in the results of an evaluation and to take note of the recommendations.

Responsible use of resources: Ethical conduct in evaluation increases the chances of acceptance by the parties to the evaluation and therefore the likelihood that the investment in the evaluation will result in improved outcomes.

The evaluation value added is its impartial and systematic assessment of the programme or intervention. As with the other stages of the evaluation, involvement of stakeholders should not interfere with the impartiality of the evaluation. The evaluation team has the final judgment on the findings, conclusions and recommendations of the evaluation report, and the team must be protected from pressures to change information in the report.

D. EVALUATION METHODOLOGY

Lowest Priced Technically Compliant

The lowest priced technically compliant proposal is selected based on a point system method with a minimum pass threshold and lowest price.

A two-stage procedure will be utilized in evaluating of the proposals; the technical proposal will be evaluated with a minimum pass requirement of 70% of the obtainable 700 points. A proposal shall be rejected at this stage if it fails to achieve the minimum technical threshold of 70% of the total obtainable score of 700 points prior to any price proposal being opened and compared. The financial proposal will be opened only for those entities whose technical proposal achieved the minimum technical threshold of 70% of the obtainable score of 700 points and are determined to be compliant. Non-compliant proposals will not be eligible for further consideration.

No point is allocated for the financial proposal in "Lowest priced technically compliant" method of evaluation. Therefore, the total number of points which a firm/institution can obtain under this method is only 700.

The contract will be awarded to the proposer offering the lowest price having achieved the minimum threshold of 70% of the total obtainable score of 700 points and therefore are determined to be the most responsive proposal.

Evaluation of technical proposal:

The technical proposal is evaluated and examined to determine its responsiveness and compliance with the requirements specified in this solicitation document. A proposal shall be rejected at this stage if it fails to achieve the minimum technical threshold of 70% of the obtainable score of 700 points for the technical proposal.
